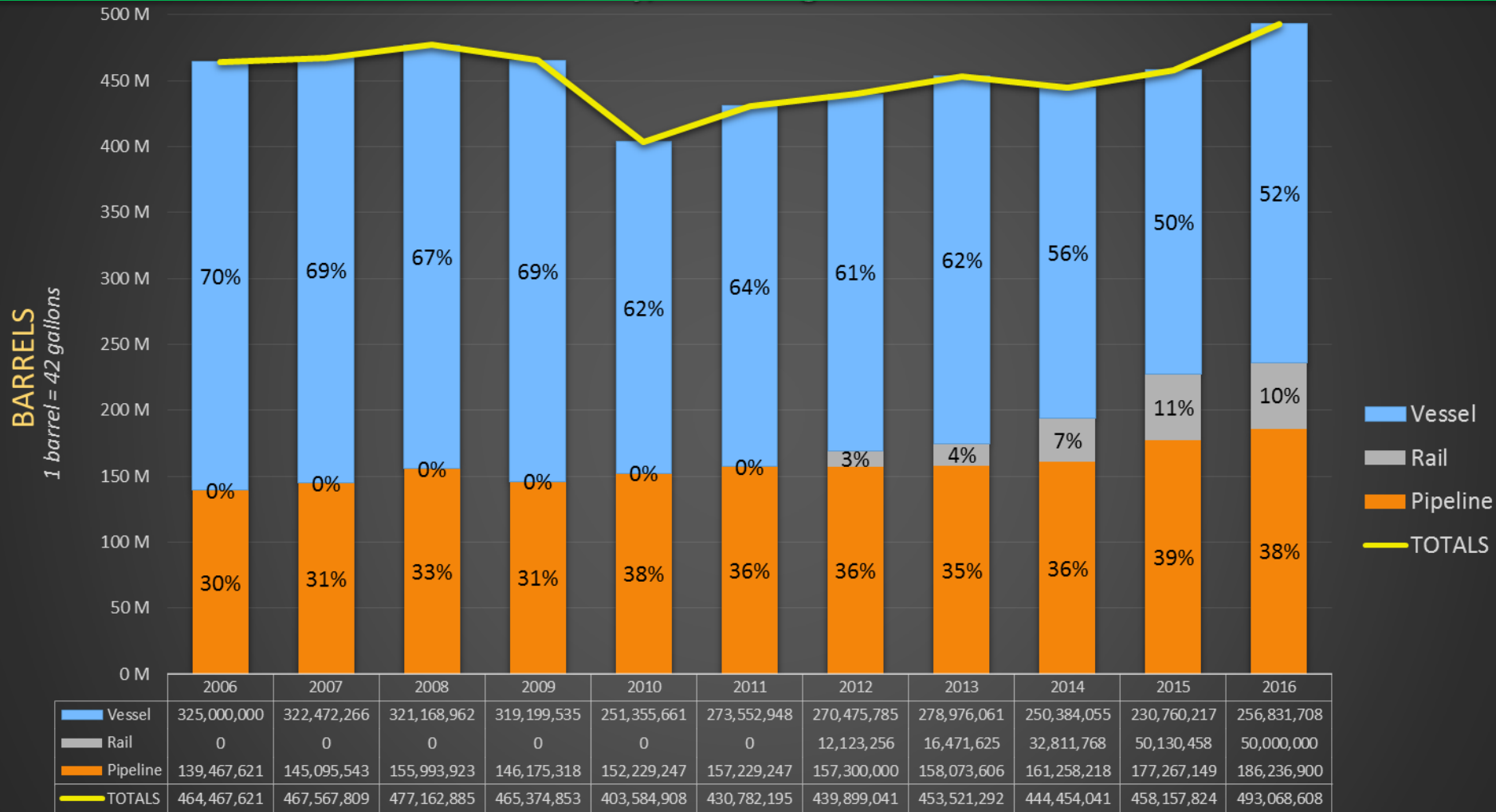

- Respond in a rapid, aggressive well-coordinated manner



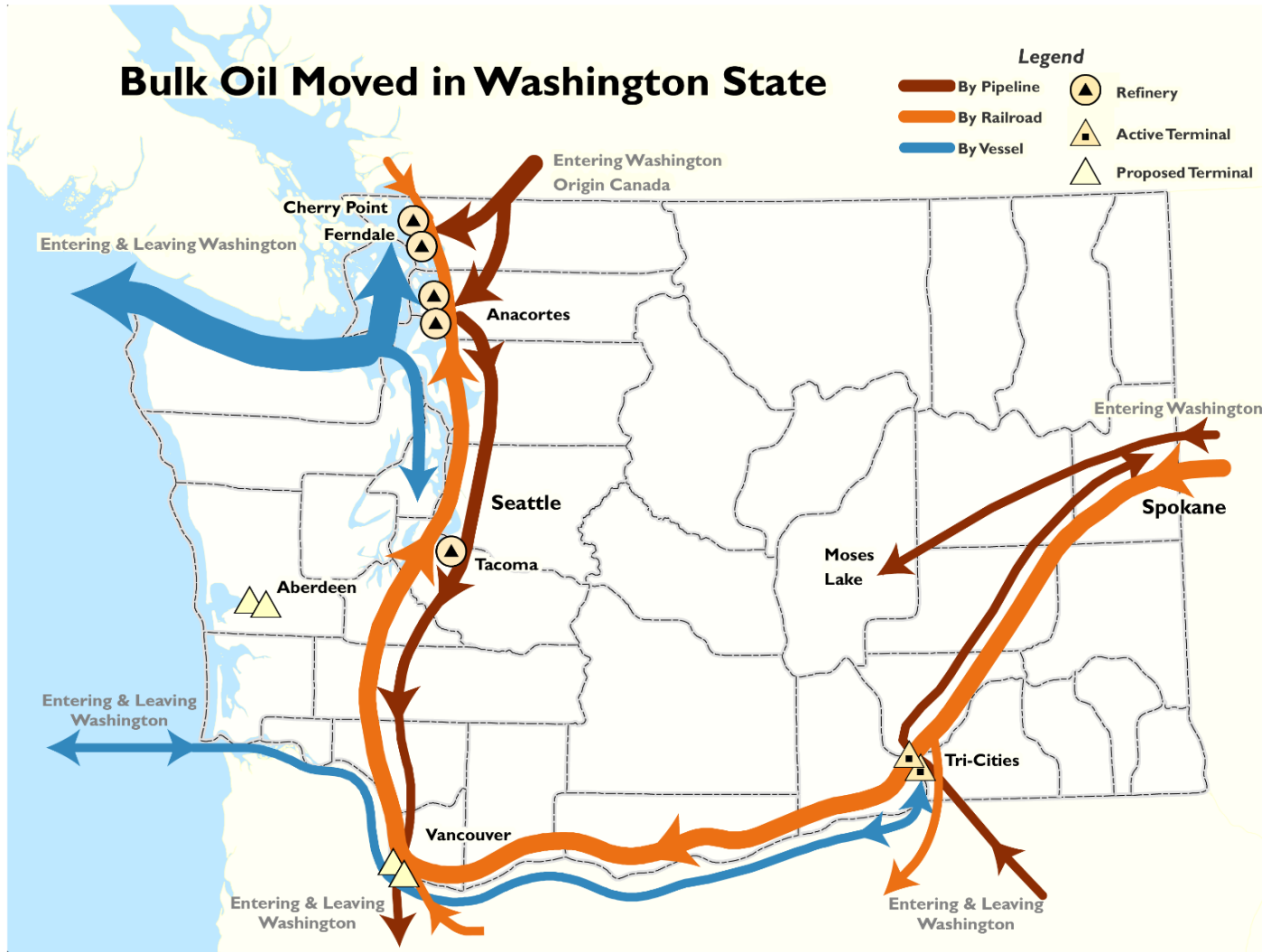
Total Oil Movement in Washington



OIL MOVED BY YEAR AND MODE

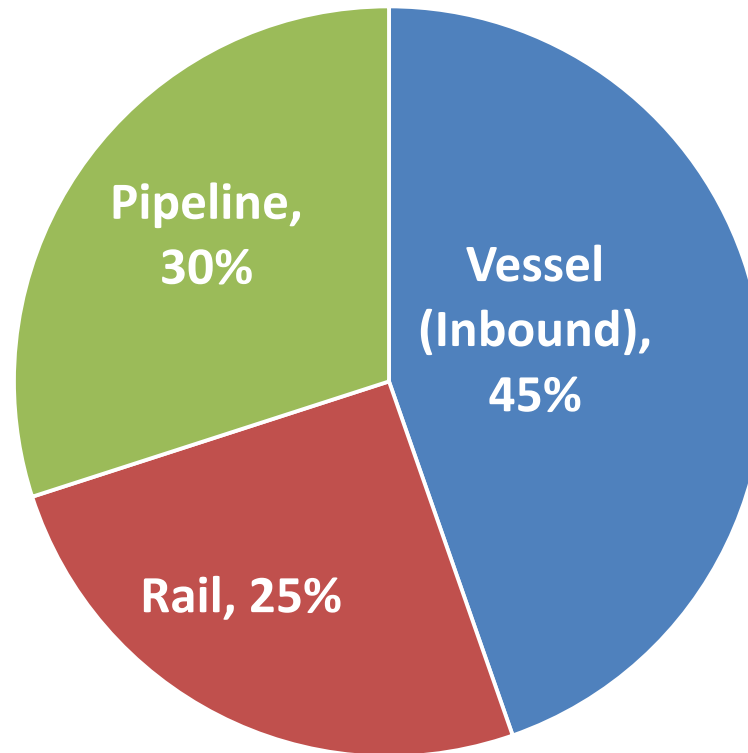


Bulk Oil Movement
