

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

Border and 2010 Olympics

This February and March saw the culmination for the 2010 Olympics Program and a high point in our border work. PNWER became an official partner with the Vancouver Organizing Committee. During the Olympics, we worked with the Province of BC, Yukon and Northwest territories to put on a number of events focussed on tourism promotion and business development. The centerpiece of our activities was the Border Symposium, "Developing 2020 Vision for the US/Canada Border," held February 22nd in Vancouver attended by Premiers Campbell (BC) and Wall (SK) together with US Ambassador Jacobson and other regional leaders.

PNWER played a vital role in the implementation of new AMTRAK Cascades Service between Portland and Vancouver, BC. PNWER's Border Solution Council continues to work with the US Department of Homeland Security, the Canadian Border Service Agency and others to improve border mobility and aid in the development of Stakeholder designed

solutions to enhance our global competitiveness.

Center for Regional Disaster Resilience

PNWER, through its Pacific Northwest Center forRegional Disaster Resilience, works with key public and private stakeholders to create and implement solutions to local and regional infrastructure vulnerability and other related needs. Since late 2001, PNWER has been working with stakeholders to develop and conduct an extensive number of exercises and other events and activities focused on critical infrastructure interdependencies with the goal of improving regional infrastructure security and disaster resilience. This year has seen a number of Disaster Resilience initiatives moved forward by PNWER and next year proves to be an even more positive year for expanding the disaster resilience program in the region. These programs include the Blue Cascades Exercise Series, March 2010--PNWER held the 6th Blue Cascades Critical Infrastructure Interdependencies Exercise, to examine the impact of a major flood during a pandemic; and the Comprehensive Community Bio-Event Resilience (CCBER) Project through which PNWER is developing community roadmap for bio-resilience. This 18 month initiative will help provide a regional strategy to address pandemics or other biological attacks/outbreaks in our region. We also assited with the Emerald Down Cyber Security Exercise, May 2010 – PNWER continues to facilitate the NW Alliance for Cyber Security. In 2010 NWACS developed a regional cyber exercise focusing on cyber impacts between the public and private sectors. Energy Horizon Institute

At the 2008 Vancouver Summit, the Energy Chair's Task Force and the Energy Horizon Project proposed the development of a Legislative Energy Institute to prepare new legislators for a commitment to energy policy. PNWER's private sector partners had recognized a need for legislators to have a better understanding of the basic energy system, including how the infrastructure works, and how public and private utility managers make business decisions to prepare for the region's future energy needs.

From this, the Legislative Energy Horizon Institute was born. PNWER approached the US Department of Energy with the idea who agreed to provide \$65,000 in seed funding to get the Institute going. PNWER reached out to major energy stakeholders, including utilities in the region, to gauge possible supplementary support. Additional funding was secured from NCSL, and from several private sector 'launch' sponsors Spectra, Puget Sound Energy, BP, Northwest Gas Association, PacifiCorp and Enbridge.

PNWER partnered with the University of Idaho's Executive MBA Leadership Institute to develop the curriculum of the 21 day executive course. Legislators who complete the 60 hours of course work will be awarded a certificate in Energy Policy from the University of Idaho. It took two months to construct the curriculum and meeting logistics, three months to recruit the first class, and 11 months to coordinate the classroom instruction.

The first of three sessions was held at the 2009 Summit in Boise. Initial feedback was very positive. In April 2010, the first 37 legislators graduated after the final session in Washington DC. As Minister of International and Intergovernmental Relations, Ms Evans will oversee the creation of a new international strategy, strengthen and promote trade and investment relationships in key global markets and advocate for Alberta's interests within Confederation. Currently Ms. Evans' efforts are to ensure that Alberta is effectively leveraging partnerships with other provincial governments and territories in Canada. Internationally, her role as a staunch advocate for Alberta's interests has found Ms. Evans engaged in global discussions on sustainable, secure resource management. Her enthusiasm for building consensus and collaboration has been particularly effective in establishing stronger relationships.

Stockwell Day has a strong background in business, community service and government. He has also worked in a

leadership role with young people as a counselor and administrator at an independent school. From 1986 to 2000, Stockwell represented Red Deer North – one of Canada's fastest growing cities – in the Alberta Legislature, where he served the Progressive Conservative government in a variety of senior roles including Chief Whip, Government House Leader, Minister of Labour, Minister of Social Services, and, from 1997 to 2000, as Provincial Treasurer (Minister of Finance) and acting Premier.

On January 19, 2010, Stockwell Day was named President of the Treasury Board and Minister for the Asia-Pacific Gateway. Stockwell Day is identified as one of Canada's leading voices in advocating democratic reform, and presently serves as Vice Chair of the International Democrat Union. Stockwell is a member of the Royal Canadian Legion and the Rotary Club. He and his wife, Valorie have 3 sons and 13 grandchildren.



David C Jacobson, US Ambassador to Canada

David C. Jacobson was sworn in at the State Department in Washington, D.C. as U.S. Ambassador to Canada on September 25, 2009, and presented his

credentials to the Governor General of Canada on October 2, 2009. Most recently, Ambassador Jacobson served as Special Assistant to the President for Presidential Personnel.

Before serving in the White House, he spent 30 years gaining expertise in the areas of complex commercial, class action, securities, insurance and business litigation as a partner at the law firm Sonnenschein, Nath & Rosenthal LLP. While working as a partner at Sonnenschein, Ambassador Jacobson also founded AtomWorks, an organization to bring together corporate, civic and academic leaders in order to foster nanotechnology in the Midwest.

Ambassador Jacobson received a J.D. from Georgetown University Law Center and was the Administrative Editor of the Georgetown Law Journal. He received his B.A. from Johns Hopkins University.



Sara Johnson, Managing Director, Global Macroeconomics

Sara Johnson is Managing Director of Global Macroeconomics with IHS Global Insight. In this role, she helps clients

assess worldwide business and financial opportunities and risks. She was previously North American Research Director and Chief Regional Economist with Standard & Poor's DRI, a predecessor of IHS Global Insight. In this role, she managed the U.S. Macro, U.S. Regional, U.S. Industry, Cost Forecasting, and Canadian services. Ms. Johnson holds a BA in economics and mathematics from Wellesley College and a MA in economics from Harvard University with concentrations in finance and macroeconomic theory.



Hon. Gary Lunn, Minister of State for Sport

First elected to the House of Commons in 1997, Gary Lunn was re-elected in 2000, 2004, 2006, and 2008. After serving as Minister of Natural Resources from

February 2006 to October 2008, he was appointed Minister Responsible for Sport and the 2010 Vancouver-Whistler Olympics and Paralympics on October 30, 2008.

Minister Lunn is a strong advocate for amateur sport in Canada, and is a former member of the Canadian Ski Patrol. He welcomed the challenge of being Minister of State for Sport as Canada hosted the world earlier this year at the Vancouver Winter Olympics and Paralympics.




Senator Lesil McGuire, PNWER President 2009-2010, Alaska

As CEO of Energy Horizon LLC, Jeff directs the Pacific Northwest Economic Region's bi-national aggregated energy resource

planning, as well as developing distributive generation energy projects. He is a co-founder of Northwest Energy Angels, the first North American angel investing group investing exclusively in new energy technologies. He is also a Trustee of the Washington State Life Science Fund.

Jeff is a past director of the Northwest Energy Technology Collaborative (NWETC), headquartered at the Washington Technology Center (WTC). Jeff and his team at WTC worked to accelerate growth of the energy-technology industry in the region. The U.S. Department of Energy recognized his achievements by naming him a "West Coast Power Player." The Northwest and Intermountain Power Producers Coalition awarded Jeff this year's recipient of the "Vito Stagliano Excellence in Electricity Policy Award." NIPPC established the award in 2006 to recognize individuals who have helped advanced innovative public

established by President Barack Obama and Prime Minister Stephen Harper, for Canada's role in international Climate Change negotiations, and for Canada's negotiations in the 2009 Major Emitters' process convened by President Obama. He has also introduced legislation to modernize penalties for environmental offences.


Hon. Edward Michael Stelmach, Premier of Alberta



Drake Landing Solar Community and the City of Okotoks Sustainable Energy Tour



Tour the town of Okotoks and the Drake Landing Solar Community. The first of its kind in North America, Okotoks' Drake Landing Solar Community is heated by a system of 804 solar thermal panels located on the garage roofs of the homes for the district space heating system with two additional solar thermal panels on each home's roof for their personal domestic hot water heating. The solar heat is collected via a glycol solution which is transported to the Energy Centre for short term and long term storage.

This unprecedented system provides 90% of each home's space heating requirements, resulting in less dependency on limited fossil fuels.





I look forward to sharing all this and more with you next year at the 2011 PNWER Summit.


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
